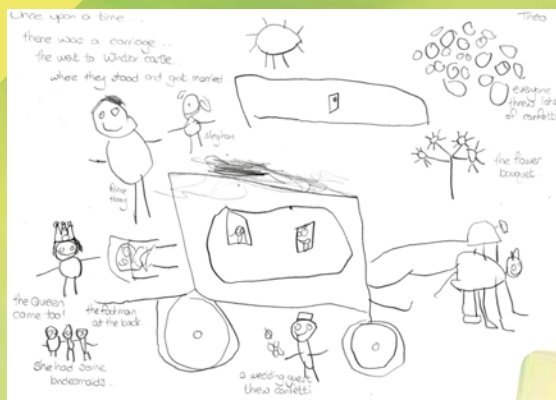


After talking about the Royal Wedding, pre-school pupil **Theo Hamblett** decided to write and illustrate his own story of the event.

After lots of wedding fun and finding-out sessions using staff members'

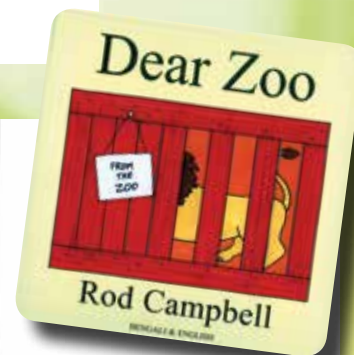
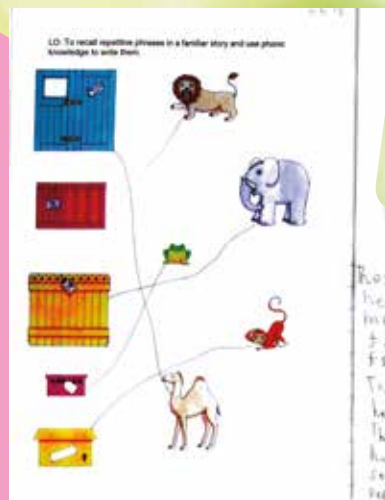
own wedding photo albums and looking at their dresses, the four-year-old was captivated! He even encouraged us to find out more about Harry and Meghan online - **lovely!**

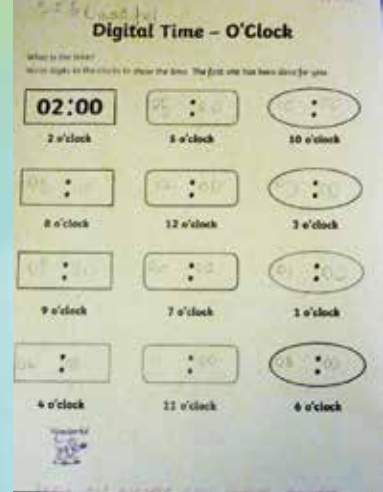

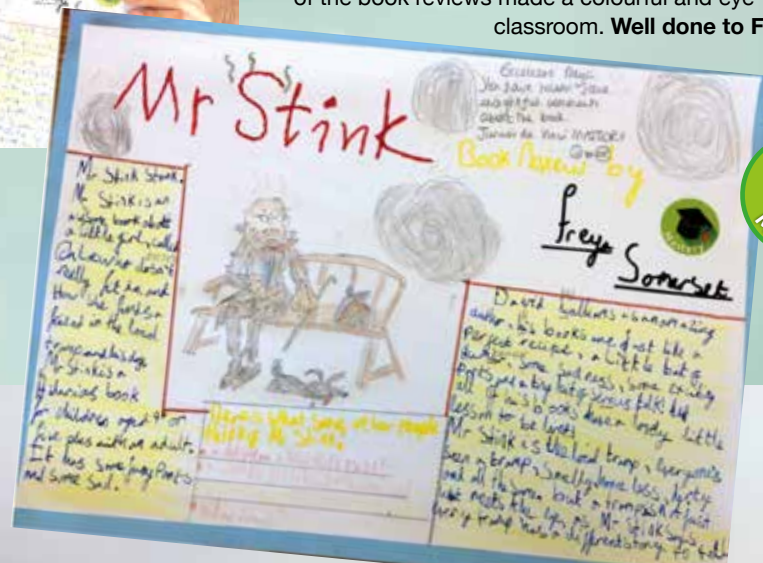

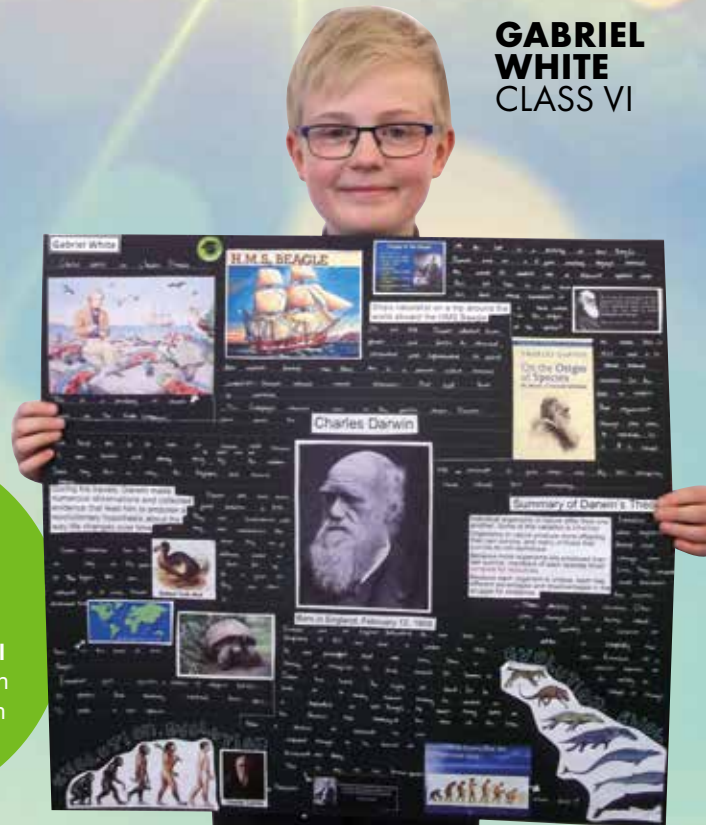
